DEAR FRIEND,

As an organization, United Hatzalah always has prioritized training for our volunteer medics. This past year our volunteers were nimble in responding to the humanitarian crises worldwide because of the professional training they received in Israel year long. In 2022 we expanded our lifesaving operations in Israel while at the same time launching a full-scale humanitarian rescue operation in Ukraine and the surrounding countries. We are pleased to share our 2022 Year In Review, reporting updates on our expanded training, growing national footprint, and increased impact in important communities across Israel.

United Hatzalah volunteer medic teams have been operational in Ukraine since 2015. As soon as the Russia Ukraine war erupted, we quickly mobilized, sending delegations of medical and psycho trauma responders to the Moldova-Ukraine borders. During the first critical weeks of the war, United Hatzalah assisted 32,000 refugees, serving 50,000 hot Kosher meals, mobilized field hospitals, refugee tents, and absorption centers in Kishinev, and provided medical care and psychological support to the citizens of Ukraine. Thanks to your commitment to United Hatzalah, "Operation Orange Wings" airlift operation evacuated 3,000 refugees to Israel. In the following pages, we hope you are inspired by our work helping fellow Jews in this region.

In Israel, we continued to focus on training and expanding our number of volunteers nationwide. Our Women's Initiative prioritized the recruitment and training of female medics. We successfully increased the number of female medics by 23%, adding 165 new women as volunteers. Under this initiative, the Inspiring Mothers of Hatzalah program (IMAH) was founded, recognizing the need to train widows within the Haredi community with medic training and certification to lead to economic opportunities in healthcare. We successfully trained 30 women during the fourth quarter opening the doors for these women to be on a path of financial self-sufficiency while building support and friendships with fellow IMAH participants.

To support the growth of our volunteer corps, a key priority is an investment in expanding our national footprint, allowing us to support our medics with cutting-edge training and equipment. We launched two exciting new capital projects this past year – A Bomb Shelter and Volunteer House in Sderot, and a new National Logistics Center in Beit Shemesh. We have successfully began fundraising for these projects and will be seeking additional support in 2023 to complete these projects.

Our global sustainability and fundraising efforts have included the creation of an Endowment, to support the training of a single medic in perpetuity, supporting a Day of Lifesaving in perpetuity, as well as a Legacy Program encouraging our supporters to include United Hatzalah in their estate plans.

Thank you for another year of supporting the amazing volunteer medics of United Hatzalah and partnering with us to save more lives in Israel and around the world. We hope you enjoy reading the following report and are inspired by the incredible work we were able to do with your support.

BOY REQUIRES AIR EVACUATION AFTER HIKING INJURY

On a Wednesday morning, a group of hikers in the Mount Arbel National Park in Northern Israel called emergency services when a 12-year-old boy from their group was hit on the head by a falling rock.

United Hatzalah volunteers EMT Meir Hayon and EMT Netanel Azarzar arrived together at the entrance to the Arbel Reserve 6 mins later. "We were the first responders there," said Hayon. "We weren't able to enter with our ambucycles, we trekked down the mountain on foot, a 2½-km hike, to reach the spot where the injured boy was. All the while we stayed on the line with the dispatch center to keep them updated on our progress." When the EMT's arrived at the hiker's location, they immediately stanched the bleeding from the gash on his head. They then proceeded to check his vital signs and perform additional medical tests, as well as bandage other wounds.

"The boy was conscious, but as time passed he slowly started disconnecting and forgetting things," Hayon recalled. "He had suffered a severe head trauma and we suspected he had suffered a concussion and required immediate evacuation to a hospital."

Hayon and Azarzar asked for an immediate evacuation via helicopter, which arrived within a few minutes. The 12-year-old boy was flown to Rambam Health Care in Haifa in mild to moderate condition.



TZITZIT SAVED THE LIFE OF A BUS CRASH VICTIM

The fringed ritual garment – tzitzit – worn by a United Hatzalah EMT, saved the life of a young woman whose legs were seriously hurt in a bus crash in Jerusalem, after he turned it into a tourniquet to stop her heavy bleeding. Shalom Klein was standing at the bus stop on Shamgar Street in the Romema quarter with his wife and seven-month-old son when an Egged bus careened out of control and smashed into the bus stop where they were standing.

Fortunately, Klein and his family were unharmed, but others on the sidewalk were not so lucky. Klein quickly took his family to safety across the street and then rushed back to help the injured. "I didn't have time to worry about getting medical equipment, I just ran." Klein ran back across the street and saw a mother and daughter lying on the ground, already dead. "It was painful to admit, but the mother and child were already deceased and I couldn't help them," he said. "I did find a young woman with severe injuries to both of her legs. I took off my tzitzit and tied them around one of her legs as a tourniquet, stemming the blood flow. Another United Hatzalah volunteer EMT arrived and tied a tourniquet on her other leg."

Klein later heard from a member of the young woman's family, that already before Shabbat she was beginning to show signs of recovery, and the doctors attributed the fact that she was alive to the tourniquets that were put on her legs,"

NEWLYWEDS AMONG FIRST RESPONDERS AT CAR-RAMMING ATTACK

On a Friday in Jerusalem, a young couple, Dovi and Batya Widawsky, who were married only two days prior, were getting ready for Shabbat when the day was brutally interrupted as a terrorist rammed a car directly into a bus stop packed with families and children. Dovi and Batya were in the Ramot neighborhood when the attack transpired nearby.

"My wife and I were on the way to celebrate Shabbat with family and friends in Ramot." said Dovi. "Both of us are volunteer first responders with United Hatzalah. I am an EMT and my wife is part of the Psychotrauma and Crisis Response Unit. We were only a few minutes away from the bus stop and we both rushed to the site of the attack. When we first got there the scene was still in its initial medical treatment stage, Batya began to help with the family of the two children who were in critical condition and eventually passed away. The child's father is still at the hospital."

What happened is very sad, but we do our best to help when we can. Batya added, "I assisted in emotionally stabilizing a young boy and treated his mother before taking her to identify her son. It was a very difficult situation but I am glad I was able to provide some help in the face of this tragedy," she concluded.

Saving Lives In Ukraine

When the Russia-Ukraine war erupted, United Hatzalah quickly mobilized to send delegations of medics and psychotrauma responders to the Moldova-Ukraine borders. United Hatzalah assisted refugees during the first few critical weeks of the war, serving hot meals to the hungry, and providing medical care through our field hospitals, in our refugee tent shelters, and in refugee absorption centers in Kishinev.

In 2022 United Hatzalah provided 32,000 refugees with medical care, psychological support and humanitarian aid. We brought 145 tonnes of food, medicine, and humanitarian aid to refugees as well as hospitals and Jewish communities in Ukraine, and cooked and served 50,000 kosher meals. As part of Operation Orange Wings airlift operation, United Hatzalah chartered 35 humanitarian, rescue, medical and cargo flights which airlifted 3,000 refugees to Israel. Numerous special missions evacuated injured, babies, Holocaust survivors, and other vulnerable people to safety.

HURRICANE FIONA + IAN

When Hurricanes Fiona and Ian hit land in September and October, United Hatzalah dispatched teams of highly trained and experienced International Psychotrauma Responders and EMT's to provide emotional and mental health support to displaced people in Puerto Rico and Florida.

The teams were deployed to the areas of San Juan, Ponce, Guayama, and Guánica in Puerto Rico and Fort Myers, Cape Coral and Naples in Florida, in order to assist and provide critical psychological support and emergency first aid to the disaster-struck communities.

HURRICANE FIONA Puerto Rico

PROVIDING CRITICAL PSYCHOLOGICAL SUPPORT AND EMERGENCY FIRST AID IN PUERTO RICO

On Friday, September 23rd, a team of United hatzalah first responders and mental health experts arrived in San Juan to assist residents in the wake of Hurricane Fiona. The battered residents, particularly in the southwestern side of the island, were hit hard by the storm, with many having lost power and water for extended periods of time. After quickly gathering supplies and consulting with local officials and rescuers, the international team set out to begin providing assistance.





TREATING THE TRAUMA OF HURRICANE IAN ONE SURVIVOR AT A TIME

Just over a week after United Hatzalah sent a mission to Puerto Rico to assist with Hurricane Fiona, the organization dispatched a second relief team, to assist in Florida following the devastation caused by Hurricane Ian. "This is our fastest turn-around time ever for separate missions," said Vice President of Operations of United Hatzalah Dov Maisel. "Our team from Puerto Rico just came back to Israel shortly before Shabbat and another team is heading out to Florida tonight. It makes me proud of all of our dedicated volunteers."



KAMILA'S STORY

A PSYCHOLOGIST FIRST RESPONDER SPEAKS
ABOUT THE DEVASTATION FOLLOWING
HURRICANE FIONA IN PUERTO RICO

My name's Kamila Forkosh – Lavan, and I'm a practicing psychologist from Jerusalem. I volunteer with United Hatzalah of Israel's Psychotrauma and Crisis Response Unit.

The psychological work came with very mixed feelings. It is difficult to see people suffering after having lost everything they own. I felt a sense of satisfaction helping people. We helped people in two different districts that hadn't yet received help from other agencies or government bodies. In Anasco and Loiza we met with people in their homes, in community centers, and outside, individuals as well as groups, and we worked with them. They shared with us their stories of how they were scared of the noise because of hurricane Maria, five years ago, and how they had difficulty sleeping and rebuilding because they don't know when another hurricane will hit.

Each of us has had our own moments where we have cried on the shoulders of one of our fellow team members. The compassion and sense of humanity that everyone shares with one another is very heartwarming for me to see.

Ten Kavod

In 2012 the Ten Kavod program was established in response to the many incidents of elder neglect reported by our volunteer medics. The program's mission is to provide a safety net for Israel's at-risk Holocaust survivors and elderly population living alone in the community.

Through weekly home visits by trained volunteers, the program provides free medical supervision and ensures that their day-to-day needs are met. The weekly visits improve the mental and emotional state of the elderly by alleviating loneliness.

YOUNG LEADERSHIP

United Hatzalah Young Leadership is the next generation of leaders, successful movers and shakers whose goal is to add value and ensure the long term future of United Hatzalah's lifesaving mission in Israel. NCSY- CAMP RESCUE

Hatzalah Rescue is a co-ed travel program organized with NCSY. Teens are certified as emergency medical responders, and they learn all of the basic skills involved, including CPR, hemorrhage control, and more. These teenagers volunteer on ambulances, assist United Hatzalah's National Dispatch Center, and learn the intricacies of emergency operations. In 2022, we had 50 teens participated in the program. They responded to hundreds of calls, went on dozens of ambulance shifts, and saved many lives, all while having the most meaningful summer of their lives.

NREMT- NATIONAL REGISTRY OF EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIANS

The NREMT program trains international students studying in Israel to become EMTs. We are a national registry, and our students receive EMT or EMR certification that is recognized by the United States National Commission for Certifying Agencies. We are also associated with the Commission on the Accreditation of Allied Health Educational Programs, so our students are fully-accredited EMTs or EMRs in both Israel and the United States. In 2022, over 100 students gained emergency medical certification through the NREMT program.









OUR HEADQUARTERS:

United Hatzalah's National Headquarters is strategically located near Jerusalem's City Entrance, String Bridge and Central Bus Station.

TURNING VISION INTO REALITY:

The volume of distress calls to United Hatzalah is increasing each day, surpassing 2,000 calls a day. In order to better meet this demand and increase our capacity to save lives, we have recognized the need to expand our current facility by adding six floors to our Headquarters in Jerusalem.

This expansion would enable us to provide advanced training to our volunteers in-house, as well as create a national life-saving campus, enabling United Hatzalah to save even more lives each year.

Help us expand and offer better, faster response to every emergency.

United Hatzalah has been allocated a plot of land to build United Hatzalah's future National Logistics Center. Centrally located on Route 38 near Beit Shemesh, it is fully accessible to all parts of the country. At over 7,000 square meters, our new logistics center will be more than twice the size of our current warehouse, providing us with ample space to store and distribute supplies for our ever-expanding lifesaving response.

United Hatzalah's uniquely designed National Logistics Center will house the following critical services: state-of-the-art trauma simulation center, vehicle repair facility, backup dispatch center, supply and equipment warehouse, oxygen refill base, training classroom, and an auditorium.

The expected cost to establish this advanced facility is \$20,000,000. Construction is anticipated to begin in 2023 and be completed by 2025. This new facility will eliminate the strain of the ever-increasing rental costs and enable us to continue expanding our Emergency Medical Services network throughout Israel and save more lives.




